#### Dear Friends.

One of my favorite trips is to the heart of southern Africa to see the spectacular wildlife of the Okavango Delta in Botswana, combined with a week of exploring the desert in Namibia, where an inspiring, community-led conservation story continues to play out. That story combines the power of community-led conservation with a tale of renewal—of wildlife populations and communities both.


Namibia was the first African country to incorporate protection of the environment into its constitution.

In 1996, legislation was passed that enabled Namibian communities to form communal conservancies to promote sustainable natural resource management by giving local communities rights to wildlife management and tourism—a new concept at the time. The first four communal conservancies were soon registered, and benefits began flowing to these early pioneers. By the end of 2020 there were 86 registered conservancies in Namibia. Communal conservancies now cover more than 20% of Namibia's land. Over 227,000 citizens—one in five rural Namibians—live within a conservancy.

The conservancy model has produced economic benefits for communities and impressive gains for wildlife. Namibia's elephant population has more than tripled; black rhinos, once near extinction, have rebounded; and free-roaming desert lions—reduced to fewer than 25 by the mid-1990s—now number over 150.

I love how Namibia has found a way to translate conservation of species into the strengthening of communities and has done so in a way that is completely its own. WWF has worked in Namibia for more than two decades. We are proud of all that's been achieved and will be there as long as we are needed.

Classifications like "endangered" and "vulnerable" have specific scientific meanings. WWF uses the standards of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN).

IUCN standards and the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species were developed to provide a consistent, objective system for evaluating populations. While the main criterion is the measured or observed reduction in numbers, other factors include habitat loss and fragmentation, reduction in the number of mature individuals, and other environmental considerations that put species at risk.

#### PROTECTING BRISTOL BAY

A Big Win for the Planet and People in Alaska

As 2022 ended, we celebrated a major victory for conservation, sustainable development, and Indigenous rights in Alaska.

With our Bristol Bay Victory Challenge (BBVC) partners, we're proud to announce the permanent protection of 44,000 acres of important salmon habitat owned by the Indigenous people of Pedro Bay, Alaska.

The Bristol Bay region truly runs on salmon: the Bering Sea fishery—valued at over \$2 billion and employing more than 15,000 people—supports both the local economy and the cultural and subsistence needs of local communities.

Native communities in the area have practiced subsistence living for countless generations, resulting in a deep understanding of the land and its species and how best to steward and conserve them in perpetuity.

WWF's work is focused on collaborating with communities to build long-term sustainable economies—based on an alternative to mining—and help them secure a sustainable future around the spectacular salmon runs that bring life to the region.

#### **BLACK-FOOTED FERRET MONITORING**

Innovative Technology Tools

Approximately 390 endangered black-footed ferrets exist in the wild. To effectively design conservation interventions—and reach the recovery goal of 3,000 adults—we need to estimate the size and health of existing populations.

But detecting and observing these nocturnal, burrow-dwelling animals is a challenge. The most effective monitoring tools scientists have to date are high-intensity spotlights mounted to truck windows or roofs, which are used to locate ferrets within prairie dog colonies by eyeshine. While effective, this technique is time consuming and relies heavily on unobstructed views to successfully spotlight individuals. In addition, ferrets sometimes shy away from the light and truck sounds, further inhibiting efforts to correctly estimate population numbers.

To eliminate some of the challenges of spotlighting for ferrets, WWF and partners are testing forward-looking infrared (FLIR) cameras on the Fort Belknap Reservation in Montana. FLIR cameras use a thermal system that senses infrared radiation (body heat) of an individual, an advantage over searching for eyeshine. Adding FLIR cameras to the toolbox increases our ability to find and count ferrets at all reintroduction sites, as well as to livetrap and vaccinate individual animals against sylvatic plague.

#### **SMALL BUT MIGHTY**

Pollinators Critical to Ecosystems

When most of us think of the Northern Great Plains and the wildlife that lives there, our minds often turn to the larger creatures—bison, pronghorn, owls, and swift foxes—that have made these grasslands famous. However, without the small creatures that live here—dung beetles, spiders, and springtails—the ecosystem would fail. Among these, none are more important than our insect pollinators.

Pollinators, like the western bumblebee, are responsible for doing so much more than just producing the foods we eat. The seeds that are developed because of pollination provide food for birds and many other species, the plants that grow from the seeds help to bring rainwater deep into the soil through their vast root systems, where it is stored until times after drought; and these plants also store carbon, which helps fight climate change.

I hope that more people will begin to appreciate these irreplaceable, threatened species that do so much for our world.

#### **BRINGING BACK STREAMS**

Artificial Beaver Dams Store Water for Dry Days Ahead

Many streams across the Northern Great Plains are degraded due to dewatering, vegetation removal, and the eradication of beavers, whose dams create natural water holding and dispersal structures.

To capture water that runs episodically in these creeks, a growing number of ranchers are installing beaver dam analogues to mimic beaver dam function. While the presence of beavers may be preferable, it is not always possible to introduce animals where they are most needed. These analogue installations mimic beaver dam functions in a stream ecosystem. Spanning the width of the channel, each beaver dam analogue uses a matrix of mud, branches, stems, and wooden posts in the streambed. During high-flow events, dam analogues hold water back, creating humanmade beaver ponds.

As the water in these ponds overflows the stream bank, the channel reconnects to the previously isolated floodplain. In 2022, four ranches partnered with WWF to install more than 120 beaver dam structures across approximately two miles of streams.

#### **MONARCH BUTTERFLY SURVEY**

Troubling News for Monarchs

Monarch butterflies cluster in the warmth of central Mexican forests each winter, the destination is an over 2,500 mile journey from the U.S. and Canada.

Since it's impossible to count individual butterflies, the best method measures the area of forest monarchs occupy in the hibernation colonies in the Monarch Butterfly Biosphere Reserve. The most recent monarch butterfly survey, led by WWF Mexico, shows that this winter the number of monarch butterflies in the hibernation forests decreased by 22% in just one year. A second report highlights increased forest degradation in monarch colonies. Together, the two reports offer a stark reminder of the vulnerability of this unique migratory phenomenon.

As important pollinators, monarch migration helps increase the diversity of flowering plants benefiting other species and contributes to the world's food supply. But unfavorable conditions resulting from the climate crisis are disrupting their journey. And the milkweed they lay their eggs on and the only food source for emerging caterpillars, is being depleted along their route. Monarchs are in trouble.

WWF is working to conserve monarch butterflies and their miracle of migration by protecting the areas they depend on. To protect overwintering grounds, WWF supports proper forest management and sustainable projects that provide alternative income to local communities. By more sustainably managing forests and grasslands, we can realize benefits for both people and nature.

#### ADDRESSING THE CLIMATE CRISIS

Nature-based Solutions

As the climate crisis intensifies, it's critical to address increasing risk from rapid environmental change while at the same time helping people and wildlife adapt.

Nature itself can be part of the solution. Nature-based solutions—actions or policies that harness the power of nature—could play an important role in minimizing climate change and its effects, addressing such threats as water security and growing risk of disasters.

These solutions involve protecting, restoring, and sustainably managing ecosystems in ways that increase their resiliency and ability to address the challenges, while also safeguarding biodiversity and improving human well-being.

It is critical to expand our toolkit to address the climate crisis, and it's becoming clearer that nature must be at the heart of these efforts. Nature-based solutions combined with traditional solutions and science-based targets could be key to increasing our potential for protecting people and wildlife.

Around the globe, WWF partners with governments, businesses, and local communities to develop nature-based solutions that restore ecosystems and help people adapt to climate change. With nature on our side, people benefit too.

#### SECURING COLOMBIA'S HERITAGE

Protecting the Nation's Landscapes and Seascapes

Last June, WWF joined the government of Colombia and a broad coalition of private and public sector partners in launching Heritage Colombia, an initiative that secures \$245 million of public and private finance to permanently protect 32 million hectares of iconic Colombian landscapes and seascapes.

I am proud to have been part of the WWF team—working over years and across time zones and multiple countries—that brought this deal to life to chart a vision for durable conservation in Colombia. Heritage Colombia will secure lasting conservation for terrestrial ecosystems in the heart of the Amazon, the Andes, the Orinoco, and the Caribbean coast, and opens the door to new and expanded marine protected areas in the Caribbean and Pacific.

Through Heritage Colombia and similar initiatives in Brazil and Peru that I have worked on over the last 10 years, WWF has helped secure permanent protection for 12% of the entire Amazon rain forest. But the signing ceremony we celebrated in Bogotá represents a beginning and not the end.

Over the next 10 years, WWF will work with our partners to make the vision of Heritage Colombia a reality, so that Colombia's rich natural wealth can continue to benefit the millions of people who depend on it.

#### **DEFENDING INDIGENOUS TERRITORY**

High-Tech Tools Make a Difference

The Uru-Eu-Wau-Wau Indigenous people live on an island of rain forest surrounded by farms in the Brazilian state of Rondônia. Critically important for its rich biodiversity and freshwater sources, the land has been threatened for decades. With deforestation in the Amazon at its highest rate in more than 15 years, livelihoods and culture are at risk.

Illegally cleared land in the Amazon often leads to wildfires. In the wake of the devastating Amazon wildfires of 2019, WWF collaborated with the Kanindé Association of Ethno-Environmental Protection to supply the Uru-Eu-Wau-Wau with monitoring equipment including drones, smartphones, and camera traps—and field training to record illegal deforestation. The drones provide high-resolution images, videos, and GPS mapping data that allow the Uru-Eu-Wau-Wau to document deforestation while avoiding unexpected and potentially deadly confrontations.

The information collected, organized, and mapped can be used by public agencies, nongovernmental organizations, or Indigenous organizations to aid the Uru-Eu-Wau-Wau in their fight against deforestation. Combined with their traditional knowledge of the ecosystem, land surveillance technology has become a critical territorial protection and conservation tool.



#### CLIMATE TRANSFORMATION FOR THE GALÁPAGOS

Tackling the Crisis and Increasing Resilience

The Galápagos Islands, located in the eastern Pacific Ocean, are a global natural treasure. A new program, funded by the Green Climate Fund, will help the island community play its part in tackling the climate crisis and increasing resilience to its impacts.

The work will include helping the islands switch to more renewable energy sources, sustainably manage agricultural land, and restore ecosystems. More than 250 green jobs should be created in the energy, agriculture, fishing, and tourism sectors, generating work for thousands of others.

WWF-Ecuador will work with partners to implement climate adaptation measures in the fishing sector, promote nature restoration on land and in the sea, and generate awareness of and participation in the program among the island community.

We are committed to safeguarding threatened habitats and the rights of the Indigenous stewards fighting to protect them.

#### A WIN FOR WILD TIGERS

Legislation Against Wildlife Crime

In a big win for tigers, the U.S. Senate passed legislation to help keep captive tigers from ending up in the illegal trade of their parts, a major threat to big cats in the wild. It also helps ensure the welfare of captive big cats and public safety by requiring a federal permit for big cat ownership. Now signed into law, it provides strict protections and management for big cats as well as the communities in which they are being held.

About 5,000 captive tigers live in the U.S. with little oversight of them and other big cats so they can easily slip off the radar and into black markets. Requiring a federal permit for ownership will give us a better understanding of the state of captive tigers. This helps protect wild tigers, too, because it will likely decrease the demand for wild tiger parts and products.

With the passage of the Big Cat Public Safety Act, the U.S. has sent a global message that America stands firmly against wildlife crime and on the side of tiger conservation.





#### LIVING AMONG WILDLIFE

Finding Solutions for Coexistence

Many communities in northwest Namibia live with and among wildlife, and sightings and interactions with species like elephants and large carnivores aren't uncommon.

However, sometimes the close encounters can lead to human-wildlife conflict, which can result in loss of property, crops, livestock, and livelihoods, and cause injury and sometimes death to both humans and animals.

While I was in the Kunene region, I visited some sites to see firsthand management approaches local communities are using to reduce dangerous interactions between wildlife and people and protect their property and livelihoods.

Protective stone walls around water holes prevent elephants from breaking water reservoirs, pipes and pumps, and piping takes water to dams where elephants and other wildlife can drink away from human settlements. Predatorproof enclosures keep livestock in and predators out and reduce incidents of retaliatory killings by farmers. Solarpowered motion-sensor spotlights scare away wildlife and early-warning system towers alert farmers of nearby collared lions, sending SMS messages to rangers and community members when a predator comes close. These are all effective measures to prevent human-wildlife conflict, but to sustainably manage this issue, we need to implement a variety of approaches that also address the specific context, causes, and social factors related to the conflict.

As human demand for land continues to grow, with people and wildlife competing for resources, unlocking these kinds of practical solutions is the key to coexistence and survival for all.

The Phantoms Forest

I will never forget the first time I got a good look at a bongo, a magnificent forest antelope. As I often try to do, I went for a solo walk near Bai Hokou, the gorilla research camp in the Dzanga-Sangha protected area complexmodel of enduring conservation—in the Central African Republic (CAR). Being alone in the forest makes you much more aware of your surroundings.

As I was walking along the edge of one of the bais—forest clearings—I felt a sudden presence. I stopped and looked in the undergrowth. Suddenly, this large dark brown striped male antelope stepped out into a patch of sunlight filtering through the canopy. He did not notice me, so I got a good look at him and then spotted several others farther away in the dark forest. As quietly as they had arrived, they vanished like phantoms into the forest. It was a magical experience.

Bongos are the largest and only social antelope, living in groups of a dozen or more in the African rain forest. Few people get to see them as I did that day in the forest. Several decades ago, they were not a common sight, however, they have now become regular visitors at the Dzanga Bai.

Like the elephants and buffalos, they share this space where they feel safe, a place protected and co-managed by the CAR government and WWF since 1989. Dzanga-Sangha is one of the few places in CAR that are considered safe and provide significant benefits to the local communities. With its over 260 employees, Dzanga-Sangha is one of the largest employers in the country.

#### **GORILLA TOURISM BENEFITS** WILDLIFE AND PEOPLE

The Village of the Elephants

I recently was able to join a Natural Habitat trip to Uganda. This trip was focused on great apes, and since my Ph.D. research was on the habituation process of western lowland gorillas, I was asked to come along as a WWF expert. While it was my first visit to see the mountain gorillas in Bwindi and the chimps in Kibale, I knew a lot about the area from friends and colleagues whose own research led them there.

While visiting these parks, it struck me how instrumental tourism has been in the survival of great apes in these places. In fact, I believe it is unlikely that mountain gorillas would still exist without tourism. Tourism can indeed be an important conservation tool that also benefits local communities.

Souvenir shops line the main street near the park entrance in Bwindi and many community members supplement their income by being porters and guides to the many tourists who visit the area.

However, after this visit, the need for vigilance in best practices for gorilla tourism developed by experts like me was even more apparent. Visitor groups must be limited, and all travelers must wear masks, keeping their distance to prevent disease transmission, a significant risk to both great apes and visitors.

By protecting these creatures, we can ensure their existence in the future so they continue to enrich both our lives and the lives of local people.





#### Red Panda Bobblehead

#### WILDLIFE CORRIDORS MATTER

Passageways for Wildlife and People

Five years ago, I saw a large herd of elephants cross the road in front of a wildlife crossing sign during the monsoons. The area is part of the Kanchanjuri corridor, one of the five key movement pathways for wildlife between Kaziranga National Park and the adjacent Karbi Anglong hills in the northeast Indian state of Assam. Unfortunately, it's also bisected by a major highway, a danger to crossing wildlife and people. To reduce impacts to both from vehicular collisions, various rules—including crossing signs, speed bumps, and fines for going beyond the speed limit—have been implemented.

I felt nostalgic on my recent trip back to this same corridor, where I came across fresh elephant footprints. They reminded me again of the importance of strengthening protection for essential corridors so fragmented landscapes remain connected for wildlife.

I'm excited about the power of science—wildlife movement information through GPS collars, etc.—which can give us strong data for evidencebased protections of corridors. This data will help guide us in constructing sustainable infrastructure that protects wildlife and biodiversity while meeting human needs.

#### THIRTY HILLS SUMATRA

A Jewel of a Rain Forest

Recently, I traveled to Sumatra, Indonesia, to visit one of the most biodiverse places on Earth, a large area of forest known as Thirty Hills. Within the landscape resides a WWF-founded ecosystem restoration concession focused on protecting the lush forests of Thirty Hills and the wildlife it harbors.

This incredibly remote jewel of a rain forest is nothing short of spectacular. Together with our field teams in central Sumatra, we witnessed the tremendous work happening in partnership with the local and Indigenous communities, a key to long-term success.

Adventure lies in the heart of the jungle ... trekking among elephant footprints, passing under orangutan nests high up in the canopy, and dodging leeches are all common occurrences on the road toward ecosystem recovery.

So many inspiring people are working tirelessly every day with determination, passion, courage, and resilience to keep precious gems like Thirty Hills standing. After witnessing the success of the teams on the ground proving that saving tropical rain forests can be a win, for both nature and for people, I left Thirty Hills with excitement for what lies ahead.

#### INCREASING EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR INDIGENOUS STUDENTS

One of WWF's values is ensuring that local communities are equal beneficiaries of our conservation work. On a recent trip to Indonesia, I saw the impressive results this approach is having for the Indigenous Talang Mamak tribe of Sumatra.

A small community of hunter-gatherers, the Talang Mamak interact with outside communities while nonetheless living a largely traditional, forest-dependent life.

Educating their children, who will have to interact and trade with outside communities more than previous generations did, is made difficult by the remoteness of their villages.

One such village is in the Thirty Hills landscape, where WWF-Indonesia is working to protect a large swath of intact tropical forest. It is among the most biodiverse regions on Earth, home to critically endangered tigers, elephants, orangutans, and other iconic species.

WWF and our partners have for several years been providing school supplies, meals, and an additional teacher for the elementary school in the Talang Mamak village here. This year, colleagues and I had the honor of handing out scholarships that enable students interested in continuing their studies past sixth grade to go on to middle and high school in neighboring communities. And for the first time ever, two Indigenous students from the village are entering college, with support from WWF donors.

PT Alam Bukit Tigapuluh (ABT), which means The Thirty Hills Forest Company is working to make Thirty Hills a model of people living in harmony with nature on wildliferich land. Improving the lives of local communities is a cornerstone of the project.

#### **COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION PROTECTING SEASCAPES**

Safeguarding Ecosystems Where They Live

Conservationists have long recognized the importance of engaging with local communities as key to safeguarding the Earth's natural treasures. And I was recently part of an international research team study that supported what we already knew.

The study was focused on the governance of four marine protected areas (MPAs) in Indonesia's Bird's Head Seascape in the Coral Triangle. We found that fish biomass—the number of fish multiplied by the average weight -tended to be higher where communities are more involved in decisionmaking and management rights rather than in those sustaining penalties for violations.

When local communities take the lead in safeguarding the natural resources they depend on, both people and nature benefit. By strengthening small communities' capacity to manage their resources using traditional knowledge and customary practices, we provide an anchor for their own stability and opportunity. Support for these communities is one of the most effective ways to conserve coastal marine environments.

Over the course of my career, it's been clear that to be successful in nature conservation work, we must continue to build on scientific knowledge. But we must also increasingly engage the communities whose lives and livelihoods could be highly impacted by nature loss.

In this way, we can build better, more equitable projects that put people at the center of conservation solutions and outcomes.

#### **NEW HOMES FOR GREATER GLIDERS**

Providing a Chance for Survival

After the devastating bushfires of 2019-20 burned nearly a third of all greater glider habitat, there were serious concerns about the species' future. Already facing possible extinction from habitat destruction and climate change, this nocturnal folivore (leaf eater) has been upgraded to Endangered and now faces an increasing threat post-fire: a shortage of tree hollows, crucial to their survival. Tree hollows essential to greater glider survival can take more than 100 years to form.

WWF-Australia, in collaboration with Greening Australia and the Australian National University (ANU), worked to create a plan. They installed hi-tech, temperaturefriendly—gliders can't get too hot or too cold—nest boxes in Tallaganda State Forest and National Park, New South Wales and East Gippsland, Victoria, in the hope that the hollowdwelling marsupial might move in. The nest boxes can provide an alternative shelter that mimics the tree hollows that gliders prefer to nest in while their habitat regenerates.

Long-lasting and providing shelter, these nest boxes showed signs of tenants only weeks later. Greater gliders are likely sliding toward extinction at a faster rate than any of Australia's other arboreal mammals. But with projects like this, there is hope for their future.



**Duck-Billed Platypus NT**


